As writers and readers we will:

Spell words containing each of the 40+ phonemes already taught and common exception words.

Begin to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place. saying out loud what they are going to write about composing a sentence orally before writing it sequencing sentences to form short narratives re-reading what they have written to check that it makes sense

Leaving spaces between words
beginning to demarcate sentences using capital letters,
full stops, question marks and exclamation marks.
